

Wipe It Out: Rett Syndrome



Clint Black has known a lot of success. He has sold more than 20 million albums, recorded two dozen No. 1 singles and established his own record company. He and his wife, Lisa, are the proud parents of Lily Pearl.

And yet he also knows the pain of losing a loved one to an incurable condition. His niece died from complications of Rett syndrome. "My brother Kevin's daughter, Courtney, was taken from us and, needless to say, it was devastating to our family."

Rett syndrome is a neurodevelopmental disorder that typically shows its effects between 6 to 18 months of age. It almost exclusively affects females, impairing verbal communication, hand use, motor coordination and other brain functions.

Black supports the International Rett Syndrome Foundation, which is working to find a cure. "Progress has been made in the fight, but there is still much work to do to win the battle," he says.
